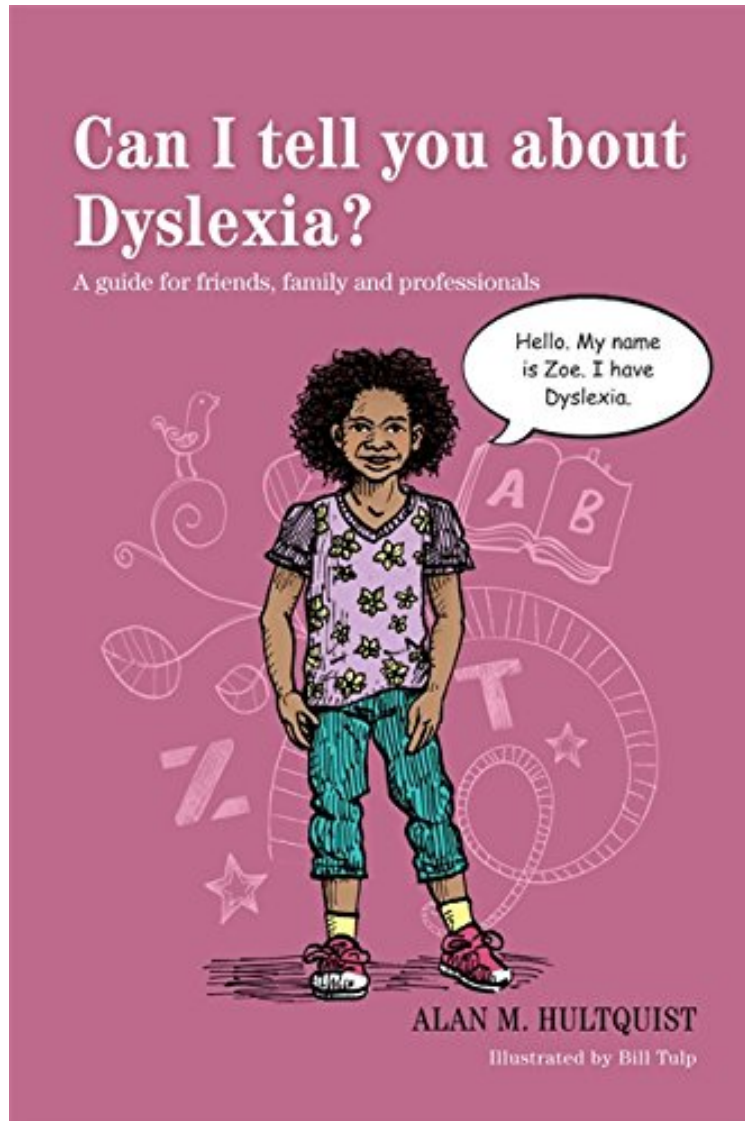

The girl describes her various learning difficulties but there is no emotional content. Here are superb books for children and teens with learning disabilities. Disability awareness and acceptance are common traits of successful students and adults with LD. Along with therapists and SPED teachers, parents play a critical role in helping children understand and cope with their disabilities.
