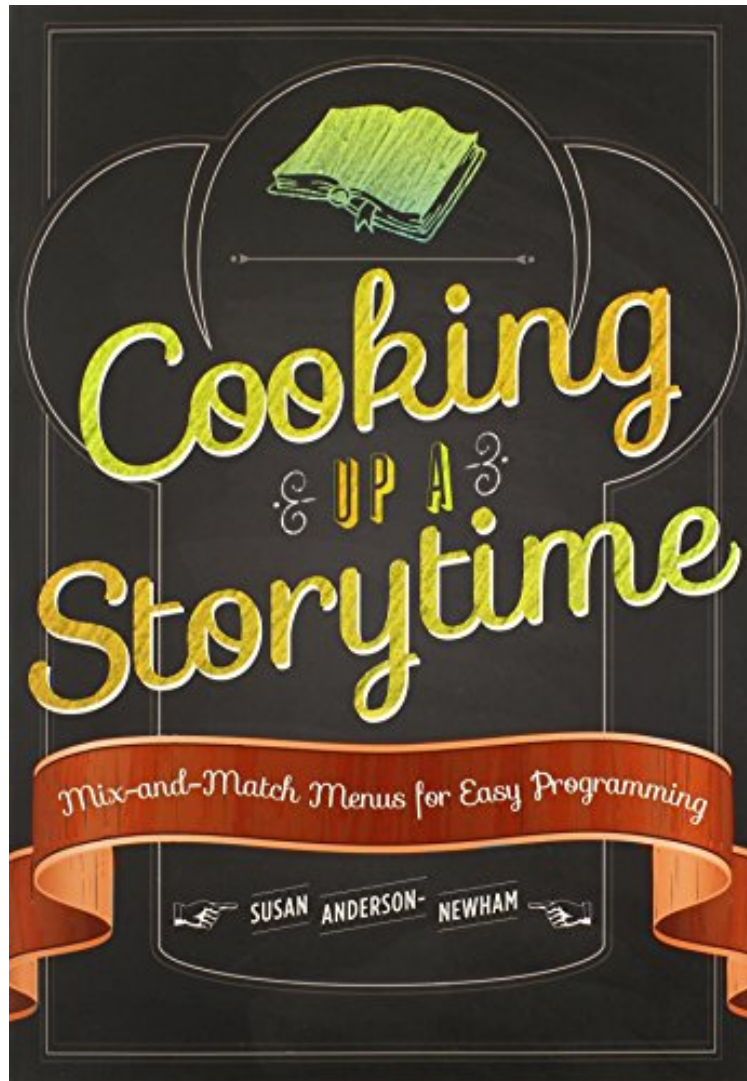


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Cooking Up a Storytime: Mix-And-Match Menus for Easy Programming
