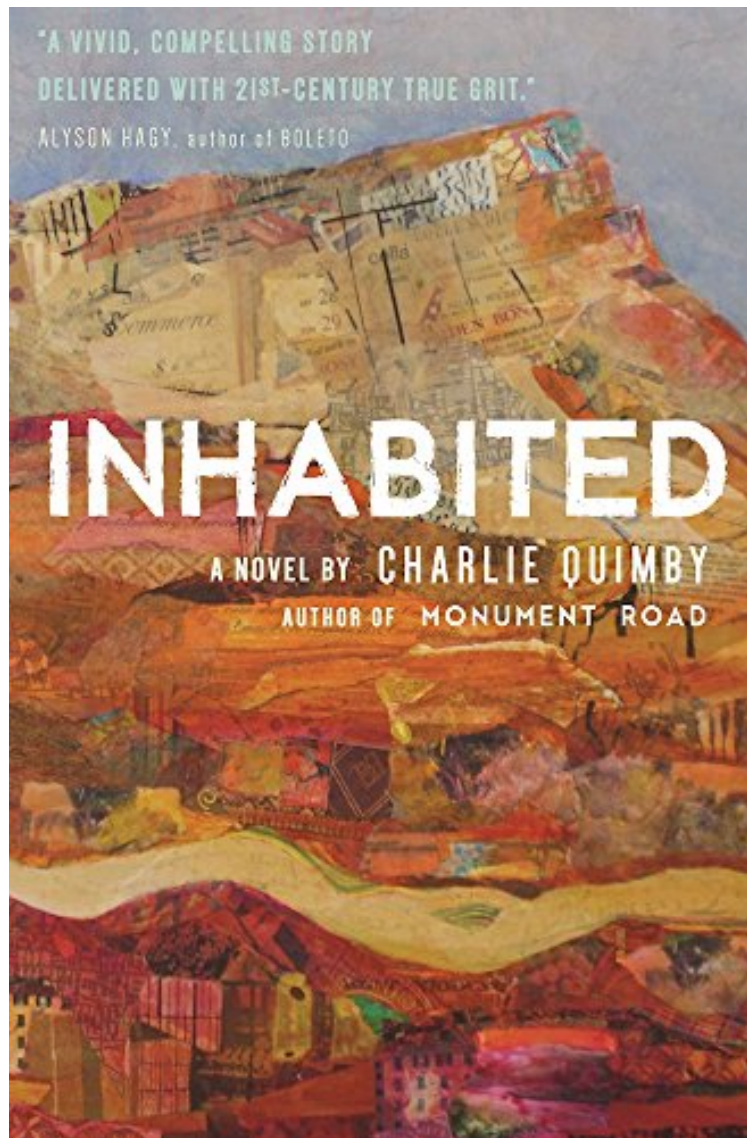

Quimby writes insightfully about Grand Junction, Colorado, its fictional inhabitants and the stress of living in a wild, but developed, community struggling find a new identity in the 2010's. The characters are well-drawn. The conflicts are real, but not overblown. It's a world, like yours, where people are generally trying to do the right thing, but are not blind to their own self-interest. Whatever their station in life, individuals have a need to be valued (although some have likely given up the ghost on being appreciated) whilst picking their way through life's narrative. In Quimby's telling, that's real. Literally speaking "Inhabited" is a sequel to Quimby's first work of fiction, "Monument Road", but the reader need not have read the first to appreciate the breadth of Quimby's humanity and storytelling chops.
