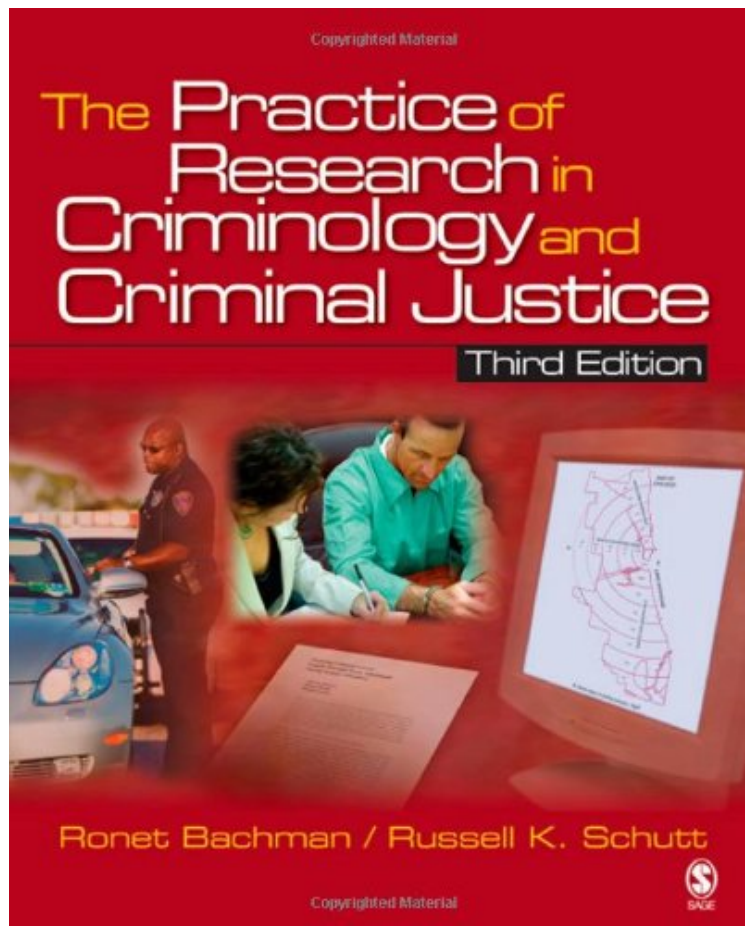

If you are not familiar with research you will struggle with this text. In addition to this text, I used the text "The Practice of Social Research" by Earl Babbie, which does a great job of breaking down the terminology.
