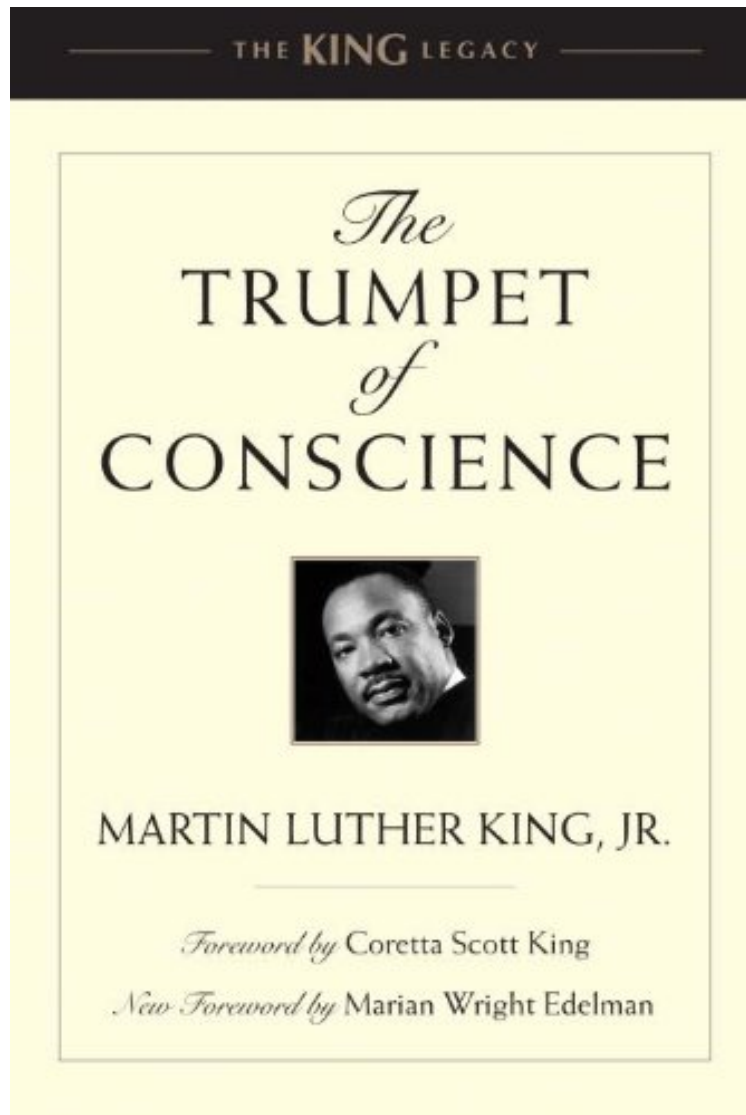

Immediately released under the title *Conscience for Change* after Kings assassination, it was republished as *The Trumpet of Conscience*. Each oration speaks prophetically to todays perils, addressing issues of equality, conscience and war, the mobilization of young people, and nonviolence. The book concludes with *A Christmas Sermon on Peace*, a powerful lecture about nonviolence as a path to world peace that was broadcast live from Ebenezer Baptist Church on Christmas Eve in 1967.

His speeches, sermons, and writings are inspirational and timeless. King was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee, on April 4, 1968. Coretta Scott King (19272006), the wife of Martin Luther King, Jr., was an author and a human rights activist. She helped lead the civil rights movement after Kings assassination, carrying the message of nonviolence and the dream of a beloved community to many countries and spearheading civil rights coalitions and foundations.
